

The Six Types of Essays

1. The EXPOSITORY Essay (EXPLANATION)

This essay describes or explains a topic. For example, "How to Teach a Cat How to Play Fetch", written in paragraphs, would work.

2. The PERSUASIVE/OPINION Essay (DEFEND AN ARGUMENT)

The author chooses a side and attempts to convince readers to agree with their thesis.

3. The INFORMAL/NARRATIVE Essay (RECOUNT A STORY)

This essay tells a story in an informal manner. It could be about the author's childhood, someone's views on an issue, etc. The essay is written in a way that "talks" to the readers.

4. The REVIEW (EVALUATE SOMETHING)

This type of essay takes something apart, (such as a film, book, or play), and analyzes it. For example, a review could cover the plot, conflict, and characters of a novel by explaining what happens, what worked, and what did not, and ultimately provide a recommendation for the audience.

5. The RESEARCH Essay (CONNECTING IDEAS)

These essays involve referencing different sources, (other books, reports, etc.), that will support the writer's thesis by supporting and connecting to the writer's own ideas.

6. The LITERARY Essay (EXPLORING LITERATURE)

A literary essay explores the meaning and construction of a novel, story, play, poem, etc. Instead of simply being a review, the writer argues for the "point" of the text by providing direct support and explanations. This could include commenting on parts of a text such as conflict, character, theme, etc., and should be supported with direct references to the piece of literature.
