Jefferson's creed that "all men are created equal." *To Kill A Mockingbird* emphasizes the racial

prejudices against the African-American population. This is evident in the treatment of Tom Robinson

while being prosecuted for a crime, the actions taken against Atticus Finch by the community of

Maycomb, Alabama, and the defense of Bob Ewell following the climax of the novel. The United States

prides itself on the assumption that criminal defendants are innocent until proven guilty but clearly

those rules do not apply when the person on trial is black.
