In the last three years, teachers at the school had to decide upon the best teaching strategy for students with learning differences. Should they continue to remediate to the students’ weaknesses or should they compensate with technology and better enable them to succeed?

Teachers worked together to integrate technology into the school curriculum to help enhance student engagement and productivity, with significant results. By using technology, students were exposed to more meaningful learning and were motivated to achieve success.

For Mother’s Day, Mr. Major had each of his students incorporate original poems, music, personal messages and photos into a movie. Students surprised their teacher with their imaginations and use of technology. With more than 10 thankful, sobbing mothers on his voicemail the Monday following Mother’s Day, Mr. Major knew the project was successful. A subsequent, similar initiative for Father’s Day garnered even more impressive results.
